Course Description

In AP US History, students investigate significant events, individuals, developments, and processes in nine historical periods from approximately 1491 to the present. Students develop and use the same skills and methods employed by historians: analyzing primary and secondary sources; developing historical arguments; making historical connections; and utilizing reasoning about comparison, causation, and continuity and change. The course also provides eight themes that students explore throughout the course in order to make connections among historical developments in different times and places: American and national identity; work, exchange, and technology; geography and the environment; migration and settlement; politics and power; America in the world; American and regional culture; and social structures.

The rigor of this course is equivalent to two college survey courses in US History. Students who successfully complete the course stand a good chance of making a passing grade on the Advanced Placement US History Examination, which will be administered in May. All students enrolled in this course must take the Advanced Placement Exam. On successful completion of the exam, students may be awarded college credit. The most critical keys to student success are consistency and commitment.

The curriculum used in this course is guided by the <u>College Board AP Placement US</u> <u>History Framework (opens in a new window)</u> and, where applicable, the <u>South Carolina</u> <u>State Standards for United States History and the Constitution (opens in a new</u> <u>window)</u>.

Students are required to take the state End-of-Course exam for US History. If students have not completed this exam, then they will take the EOC exam as the final exam for this course. If students have already completed this exam prior to beginning the course, students will take an alternative two-part final exam for this course. The alternative final-exam may also be made available to help students taking the EOC exam prepare for the College Board exam.
