Course Description

English 1 Honors is the first of four English courses designed to improve your reading, writing, and communication skills as you prepare to enter the workforce, study a trade, or attend college. Because you will read complex fiction and nonfiction texts from diverse voices as well as works you have chosen, English 1 Honors will also help you consider the perspectives of others from a variety of backgrounds and experiences which is a skill necessary for any path you choose in life. This course will give you the opportunity to make connections between texts and real-world experiences, write about texts and topics related to them, and discuss their themes with others. It will allow you to strengthen your ability to think independently about and use information to make logical decisions and present your ideas and solutions in ways that make others take notice. Simply put, this course will help you be a successful communicator long after you have finished high school.

In this course, you will consider personal, media, and global morality and justice as you:

- read and analyze complex literature and nonfiction texts.
- write analyses, arguments, expository and narrative pieces about topics or texts of your choosing.
- judge sources for accuracy and effectively back your claims with credible evidence.
- research a topic emerging from the inquiry process, related to globalization.
- present an argument based on your research.
- make choices about what you read and how you complete assignments.
- proofread and revise your writing.
- communicate clearly with your classmates about fiction, historical events, and contemporary issues.
