Course Description

English 3 Honors will improve your reading, writing, and communication skills as you prepare to enter the workforce, study a trade, or attend college. Because you will read complex fiction and nonfiction texts from diverse voices connected to American history and culture, English 3 Honors will help you consider the perspectives of others from a variety of backgrounds and experiences, a skill necessary for any path you choose in life. This course will give you the opportunity to make connections between texts and real-world experiences, write about texts and topics related to them, and discuss their themes with others. It will allow you to strengthen your ability to think independently about and use information to make logical decisions and present your ideas and solutions in ways that make others take notice. Simply put, this course will help you be a successful communicator long after you have finished high school.

In this course, you will consider perspectives in and about America, voices of select Americans, the human experience in America, and challenges facing the nation as you:

- read and analyze complex literature and nonfiction texts.
- write analyses, arguments, and expository pieces about topics that interest you.
- independently judge sources for accuracy and cohesion and back up your claims with credible evidence.
- research a topic related to a specific challenge facing Americans.
- present an argument based on your research that proposes a solution to an American challenge.
- make choices about what you read and how you complete assignments.
- proofread and revise your writing.
- communicate fluently with your classmates about fiction, historical events, and contemporary issues.
