Course Description

The United States History and Constitution course tells the story of our Nation: its birth as a colony, our rebellion from Great Britain, the formation of a New Union, Westward Expansion, the Civil War, Industrialization, the Gilded Age, the involvement in World War One, World War Two, and the Cold War to the events of today. You will study the lives of the women and men in the United States who lived the story, their triumphs, tragedies. Their experiences shaped and forged the American Spirit, and that impacts our lives today. This honors course will challenge you academically, by covering US History in more depth, and you will learn information and read material that goes well beyond the material that is presented to students in the non-honors course.

7. Impacts of Western Expansion, 1860 to 1877
8. Economic and Social Developments, 1865-1898
9. American Society and Culture in the Gilded Age
10. Progressivism Abroad and at Home
11. From the Roaring Twenties to New Deal, 1919 to 1937
12. World War II, 1937-1945
13. Bi-Polar World: The Cold War at Home and Abroad, 1945 to 1964
14. The Age of Affluence and the Liberal Consensus, 1964 to 1980
15. The Age of Scarcity and of Global Challenges, 1980 to the Present

Communication Guidelines

Participation and communication in an online class is vital since students and teachers do not see one another in class each day as they would in a brick and mortar school. As such, VirtualSC expects students and teachers to communicate regularly to ensure students continually and successfully work towards meeting course objectives.
